THE CHANGING SCHOOL.

In 1969 the requirements for Matriculation will differ almost entirely from the current regulations and for this reason there will be many changes in the Upper School during the next two years.

Yet another change you will notice is in this year's magazine. We are trying the experiment of entirely producing our own. This of course is a very much more difficult task than just preparing copy and handing it to a printer but we feel that in this issue we have something very worthwhile, as it is the students' own work complete. Having no precedent or figures to work upon, this year's committee have had an enormous task to fulfil and they have responded splendidly to the challenge. They are to be congratulated on their effort.

In this framework of incessant change, we have also to say goodbye to a large number of boys and girls leaving school. We wish them every success and happiness in their new spheres.

Shortly there will be further changes to our school in the nature of additional buildings but I hope to retain as a permanent feature of this school its very fine gardens.

These are among the very best in the state and rank highly among the very fine things done for this school by my predecessor, Mr. Reitze.

Finally, may I wish both students and staff a Merry Christmas and all happiness and prosperity in 1968.



G. Francis: "The Gentle Giant" a little more "go" and all the potential will come out with a "bang"!


D. Piesse: Troubled with back injury at C.W. the spirit was




G. Coles: The smallest member of the team, made up for this with his superb skill and ball handling ability; was always a great team man.


Songs sung by the Junior Choir were "The Birds in Spring" and Autumn Evensong". They were placed 2nd in this section.




On the whole this has been quite a successful (!!!) year and is to be hoped the Unit will go onto greater things in the future.


